was the woman who had been sitting on the front porch of her three story home in Port Au Prince when it collapsed on her and her children. She suffered a serious open tibia fracture that needed to be operated on. She was required to stay in the hospital for about one month when she was doing well and went home. She just returned for a check up as her wound started to show some signs of an infection. The doctor looked at it and she was prescribed some antibiotics and is doing better now.



#### Kai Mira

It has been several years since we last ordered a set of custom made mattresses for Kai Mira. Many of them were falling apart with cracks and creases in the vinyl. We received a generous donation from our



friends in Canada to be able to replace them. We were able to order them and ship them the beginning of March.

Over the years the walls had become stained and in a few areas grey where the paint had fallen off. The cribs



were still in good condition but were also in dire need of a paint job from the wear down. Zuleika Hodges and Joe Twidwell, who arrived in Limbé for the first time, accompanying his brother Jeff, with the surgery team, were able to help and paint the orphanage during their stay. The walls were painted a light blue color that they hoped would help brighten the children's day. The cribs were cleaned and given a fresh coat of deep sky blue paint. We thank everyone for your donations and support towards the children in Kai Mira that made this all possible!

### Wexler

Wexler had been coming to the hospital almost every day to have the bandages replaced on his left leg. He had a big ulcer on the bottom of his leg which was very painful. Cindy Cochran, a physical therapist from Torrington, WY who was in Haiti at the time Wexler came to the hospital. recognized that he had Venus Stasis Ulcer, She had previous experience with this when she volunteered in Guatemala. He was in need of a special bandage wrap called Unna Boot, which is essentially a gauze predipped in a thick, creamy mixture of zinc oxide and calamine. As we did not have that at the time they used the rolled bandages. which are so generously donated by many of you, dipped in calamine lotion and wrapped it in a particular fashion to compress the leg and promote circulation. The healing power of the calamine lotion proved worthy. Within two weeks Wexler leg already got a lot better.



### Venus Stasis Ulcer

Venous ulcers (stasis ulcer or varicose ulcers) are wounds that are thought to occur due to improper functioning of valves in the veins usually of the legs and no longer effectively pump blood back up to the heart. Blood may begin to accumulate inside the veins and at a certain point the veins thin walls that have reached their saturation point may start leaking blood into the surrounding tissue. This can lead to a breakdown of the tissue, ultimately causing an ulcer which can be very painful.
